Report of the Church Vitality Ministry

Church Vitality Ministry Purpose: To go out into the community to serve people as God directs and to encourage growth in membership and participation in Trinity Presbyterian Church.

2020 was a year that was shaped by the Covid 19 pandemic and the unfortunate, and necessary, restrictions on in-person gatherings. It was the context for every consideration made by this Ministry beginning in March. The Mission Blueprint goals, which focus on connection through interpersonal relationships with visitors, new members, current members, and outreach into our community, were all impacted. Paraphrasing an old adage "when a door closes, find or make a window", the Church Vitality team, with the assistance of the Worship Ministry, the Property Team, our staff leadership and a \$30,000 grant from the Presbytery Congregational Vitality Committee were able to do just that. They worked throughout the spring, upgrading the existing audio and video systems. Two microphones for crisper audio transmission, a camera with higher resolution for crisper video and two computers were added. A software upgrade enables broadcasting through multiple media platforms including, but not limited to, Facebook. Trinity can now Zoom congregational meetings, Ministry meetings, Christian education classes to children and adults, memorial services in the sanctuary, Dead Theologians Society gatherings, as well as Worship. A happy bonus is our new-found Remote Congregation who joins in from Tennessee and Michigan and North Carolina and many other places. Some live locally, but hadn't attended Trinity before. They're present on Sunday mornings, at Wednesday night book study, and at Spark and Fuse for their children. Church Vitality has always planned on reaching beyond the walls of Trinity, though perhaps not quite in this way, this suddenly and this successfully.

Members of this Ministry sincerely thank Bill and Andy for acquiring funding from the Tampa Bay Presbytery and doing the many, many hours of work inside the sanctuary to enable the improved audio and camera systems to be implemented. Bill and Andy- you have been the CV Ministry this year.

We can't know what the world may bring, but we can always be sure of God's loving presence, in all times, in all places, among all people.

Report of Mission Ministry

The Mission Ministry during 2020 supported four primary missions through Trinity's Mission Ministry budget plus individual contributions of volunteer time, funds and material resources. The missions were Trinity Friends of Hope, Skycrest Elementary, Shalom Orphanage, and Clothes to Kids. Sewing Hope is a part of the Ministry, but is primarily self-supporting due to the Sewing Hope Mission leader's work.

This past year brought some new challenges from dealing with COVID and all of the restrictions necessary to protect our health.

Normally during the first part of the calendar year, the Ministry assesses the requirements of each mission and schedules times for the mission to hold any events or functions. Each mission has a time slot scheduled during the year to prevent any overlapping with other missions or church activities not related to the Mission Ministry. In 2020 some of the usual campaigns were cut short or cancelled. As in the past each mission was allocated \$3,000.00 from the Ministry's budget for the congregation's financial support.

Additionally, the Ministry used designated and restricted account money available to fund special contributions to worthy mission efforts. Some of these funds came from donations made by individuals to support specific missions. By the end of the year, the restricted Missions funds had given out \$900.00 in disaster assistance and student scholarships for Clement and Winnie amounting to \$3,730.00. To support the Tampa Bay Presbytery's mission and outreach programs, we allocated \$10,800 in our budget to Presbytery Benevolences.

In October of 2017 the Mission Ministry started a new project called Sermons of Service. This is how we at Trinity preach the gospel without using words. On months with a fifth **Sunday the congregation would gather for fellowship and being of service for God's world** instead of receiving a sermon from the pastor, however this has been suspended until we can worship in person again. In 2020 the Trinity Cooking Team prepared a hot meal on Fifth Sundays for the refuge center in Clearwater.

Until March of this past year Trinity Presbyterian, through the Trinity Friends of Hope Mission; provided food and volunteers to serve hot breakfasts at the Pinellas Hope Tent City for homeless persons. After March, the cooking team prepared the meals and delivered them to the Pinellas Hope Tent City for distribution by the staff at the facility. During Easter the mission provided Easter eggs and at Christmas 100 gift bags were prepared for residents with items such as flashlights, washcloths, soap, deodorant, razors, toothbrushes, toothpaste, nail clippers, combs, socks, thermo cup, a cross and peppermint candy. During 2020 the Trinity Friends of Hope Mission prepared approximately 3,600 breakfast meals. The mission used \$5,949.80 in Ministry budgeted funds and designated monetary donations. In 2020 Trinity Presbyterian Church received a Letter of Recognition from St. Petersburg Catholic Charities for our continued support of Project Hope. The list of volunteers for the Trinity Friends of Hope Mission is as follows: Theron Bucy, Forristine Porter, Fredrick Porter, Marcus Porter, Malcolm Porter, Bill Trautwein, Kathi Trautwein, Andy Walton, and Peg Walton. Help from outside of Trinity came from Peace Memorial Dan Johnson. Members that assisted until the COVID reduced the need for as many people were Jim Bader, Mary Ellen Bader, Maureen Webb, Leticia Morgan, Jim and Leah Hayslett.

Mission Ministry Report (Cont'd)

The Skycrest Elementary Mission, led by Kay McCormick, continued through 2020 as a supported mission. Trinity's 2020 mission to the school was impacted by COVID, but the church still provided supplies and funds to assist the school's activities. May 4th bag lunches were prepared for the Teacher Appreciation Luncheon. A summer "Stuff the Bus" campaign brought in many needed supplies that were delivered to the school August 7th. Financial contributions amounted to \$3,685.00. The list of volunteers for the Skycrest Elementary Mission is as follows: Kay McCormick, Forrestine Porter, Malcolm Porter, Peg Walton, Andy Walton, Maureen Webb, Bill Trautwein, and Kathi Trautwein.

The African Mission to assist the Shalom Orphanage led by Kenny, Jim and Leah Hayslett, is Trinity's Mission to a foreign land providing money for scholarships, food for the orphans and sometimes helping the orphanage meet emergency needs. The Shalom Orphanage is totally supported by charitable donations. One month before commencing our 2020 African Mission campaign, Trinity's in person services were shut down. As a result the annual campaign for donations from our congregation was severely curtailed. This past year the COVID 19 virus has had a serious effect on the Shalom Orphanage and the number of orphans that are now living in Shalom increased to 98 so the need for food and supplies is even greater. In 2020 the mission received donations from congregation members, Hayslett Remax Real Estate and Beach Time Rental to help with the funding of the mission. The mission support for the orphanage, including the scholarships, amounted to \$9,975.00 in cash with \$3,000.00 of the funds coming from the Trinity annual Mission Ministry budget.

Clothes to Kids purpose is to help Pinellas County children in need to have the clothing necessary to attend school. The Clothes to Kids organization collects donations of clothing and money. In 2020, the organization gave out more than 11,012 wardrobes for a total of 168,646 wardrobes to Pinellas County students since the organization's founding. This year Trinity's CTK Mission provided undergarments and \$5,155.00 of cash for Clothes to Kids. Bobbie Hoopes is the Trinity Clothes to Kids Mission Coordinator.

Sewing Hope had limited opportunities for sewing and fellowship during the year due to the pandemic. They cannot sew if there are children down the hall due to safe Covid practices and the safety of all involved. The Greater Women's Club of Upper Pinellas has continued to make blankets for Eckerd Connects which resulted in 1,003 blankets delivered in 2020. Sewing Hope is led by Beverly Easterling.

Trinity Presbyterian Church, through our Mission Ministry, has a very positive effect on people and communities locally and in other lands. Concurrently the individual missions in the Ministry are bringing the members of our family of faith closer to each other when we work together to help others.

Special Events: Due to the Covid Pandemic we were unable to engage in our usual Preschool and church functions, including Holiday Parties, Holiday Singing, Field Trips, Church Singing, Theater Group Performances, Magician and Graduation Program for the Pre-K Students. We hosted our VPK graduation with a drive by celebration led by the fire and police department.

New News: Trinity Preschool is still participating in Nemours (an Early Literacy Program for VPK), the Leep Program, as well as working towards our Apple Accreditation. The Leep program allows the teachers to take college classes through Early Learning Florida to obtain their National CDA.

In-Service Training: All the teachers have met the requirements above and beyond required for licensing; this includes obtaining 20 plus hours of training per year. All CPR and first aid and fire extinguisher training is current.

Inspections: All inspections are up to date and our license has been renewed *for* the upcoming year.

PCLB (Pinellas County License Board): We are currently in compliance.

PCHD (Pinellas County Health Department): upon our last inspection the Preschool has no violations.

Financials: We ended the year with a positive balance.

At the end of the calendar year Trinity suffered the devastating loss of our beloved Music Director, Rosemary Collins. We were so very blessed to have Rosemary for the few years she was with us. She contributed so much to our worship services with her gifts of creativity, her own lovely voice and the musical skills of her children. Gabe Irizarry, who has served as our Tenor Section Leader and worked closely with Rosemary has agreed to fill Rosemary's position. We are fortunate to have Gabe join our musical team.

This concludes our report for 2020. We hope to make 2021 a better year for all of the Trinity family.

Report of the TPC GRANT Committee

The mission of the TPC GRANT Committee is the allocation and use of (long term investment funds) vs (monies from the sale of the Gulf-To-Bay property) to:

- Support the development of programs to meet Mission Blueprint goals of attracting and keeping visitors and to raise awareness of Trinity Church in the community beyond our walls
- Support property needs, specifically, capital expenditures to replace or maintain existing structural integrity for church operation of such programs on Trinity Presbyterian Church property

The goals of these programs are to go out into the community to serve people as God directs us and to encourage growth in the membership of Trinity Presbyterian Church.

Applications are reviewed by the TPC GRANT Committee and forwarded with recommended action to the Session for decision. Following the Session's decision, the applicant is notified. The following applications were recommended for funding to Session and Session voted to fund them:

Worship Ministry:

• Continue to support 4 Section Leaders in the choir Amount: \$13,050 The addition of 1 Soprano, 1 Alto, 1 Tenor and 1Baritone/Bass to the choir in weekly worship as enhanced the worship experience through music by supporting the choir and increasing the range of musical selections.

Personnel Committee:

Support salary of the Director of Family Ministries

& Communication for 2020

Funding a portion of this salary has been agreed to since the inception of the role, to ensure support of Families and Youth Ministry programs at Trinity as well as the role of Director of Communications.

Amount: \$30,000

Church activities and requests for GRANT funding of programs and property in 2020 were deeply impacted by the Covid pandemic. The GRANT funds that were approved in 2018 and 2019 to improve Trinity's online capabilities were fortuitously timed. Worship has been enabled through Facebook and the improved wi-fi infrastructure made it possible to Zoom Christian Education classes and Ministry meetings. The life of this congregation has been able to continue, even in the safety-driven absence of in-person activities. The GRANT funds that were approved in earlier years to meet property repair and replacement needs has kept Trinity's buildings well-functioning without the difficulty of trying to make emergency repairs mid-crisis when services and equipment have been constrained. In what seems anomalous, the value of the GRANT fund rose in the amount of \$285,781.74 from January 1 to December 31, 2020.

What will change and what might go back to our "regular" programming. A "Flamingle" is incubating as a way to get caught up with each other when all is safe.

The **Prayer Chain** continues its purpose and mission. Through this time of staying safe, the prayer chain continues to connect members through prayer requests. Interestingly, we are receiving more follow-ups than previously.

On Tuesday, December 15 we had our annual joint meeting with the Session but this year it was a virtual meeting via ZOOM rather than the traditional dinner.

We started the year with two deacons assigned to each of 4 parishes: A: Nancy Benchoff and Maureen Webb, B: Janis Priebe and Peg Walton, C: Cyndi Connelly and Carrie Yarbrough, D: Charlie and Wendy Snellgrove. Marti Folwell served as chair and substitute as needed. During the year we had resignations by Cyndi and Carrie.

At each meeting we review a prepared list of persons of special concern by parish. We also share information about the people in our parishes and our activities in service to them.

Communion is offered for our homebound members on the first Sunday of each even numbered month. New kits have been purchased to facilitate this. This service was cancelled as of March 15 when most church activities were cancelled due to the coronavirus.

Deacons maintain connections with their parishioners. They try to always be aware of members who may be experiencing difficulties and to communicate special concerns to the ministers. Members' input to Deacons and/or Pastors regarding a member who is ill, in a crisis situation, or hospitalized is always appreciated.

It is a privilege and a joy to be called into service as a Deacon.

Report of the TPC Foundation

The Trinity Presbyterian Foundation is a not-for-profit foundation incorporated in 1985 under the laws of the State of Florida. The Foundation is governed by a Board of Trustees, six in total in 2020, serving for three year terms, elected by the Congregation at a Congregational meeting. The purpose of the Foundation is to manage funds donated by individuals and to distribute the annual incomes to the chosen recipients. Donations are to be used to promote the Christian Faith and the principles and mission of Trinity Presbyterian Church.

In 2020, the Foundation Trustees were charged with: monitoring the two separate Vanguard accounts invested to earn income and increase wealth in the established foundation endowments, and the church's account which contains the proceeds from the sale of the Gulf-to-Bay property. Distributions from the Trinity Presbyterian Church account are directed by the Session. Distributions of income earned from the Foundation account are managed by the Trustees with oversight by the Session.

Designated funds in the Foundation account include Scholarships, Missions and Other categories as specified by the donors, which makes up 69% of the total funds. Undesignated fund income and principal are used by the Session as necessary, which makes up the remaining 31% of the total funds. 2020 began with a balance of \$970,488. After distributions of \$6,695, donations of \$475 and a market valuation gain of \$116,025 our Foundation Balance ended at \$1,041,544 with income available to distribute in 2021 of \$20,026.

The Church account also had a gain in 2020 of \$248,780. The balance at December 31, 2020 totaled \$2,303,273, including earned income for 2020 of \$45,487.

The Foundation provides an opportunity for church members (or non-members) to make gifts to Trinity, during one's lifetime, through their will or personal trust. The majority of the contributions to the Foundation are made by members who wish to share, during their lifetime, in the joy of seeing their gifts help Trinity fulfill its mission. Gifts may be in the form of securities, real estate, cash or other assets and may be made, at any time, to the Foundation. Please ask your attorney for help in planning for the future and allow Trinity to be included in that plan.

The primary responsibilities of the **Finance Team** are to establish the budget for the church year, monitor church finances on a monthly basis, and review non-budgeted expense requests throughout the year as they may arise. In 2020, members of the Team were: Church Treasurer Jim Rogers, Vice-Treasurer Joyce Barnett, Elder Cathy Arnold, and Director of Administration Rev. Kathi Trautwein.

For the calendar year ended December 31, 2020, Trinity Presbyterian Church's Operating Account showed a surplus of \$2,811, which has been added to a restricted account to be reviewed by Session for possible allocation. As a result of the pandemic in 2020, our total revenue decreased from 2019 by \$24,110, and total expenses ended the year under budget by \$29,541. The Preschool operations this year did an exceptional job covering their costs of \$432,662 with tuition collected of \$475,847.

Session has approved the 2021 budget at its December 15, 2020 meeting. The 2021 budget will be not be balanced with a shortfall of \$42,529. The anticipated revenue for 2021 is estimated to be \$967,846, and an increase of \$8,880 in expenses over last year's budget will be budgeted in 2021. Every effort will be taken to keep our actual costs below budget and the Finance Team will be faithfully reviewing the monthly financial statements and making recommendations to the Session.

2020 Mutual Ministry Report Building Families Program



TRINITY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH & NORTHWOOD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, CLEARWATER, FL

- During 2020, Building Families served 40 children and family members through our partnership with Trinity Presbyterian Church!
- A total of 4 families representing 15 individuals participated in the in-home intervention.
- Of those families 2 successfully completed the intervention and are now receiving Aftercare support.
- I family is still open, and on track for a successful graduation.
- 1 family ended services prior to completing the full program.
- Local families were also positively impacted by the Parenting Classes and Workshops that Erin offered this year.
- 4 caregivers with 6 household members participated in the Parenting Class Series offered by Erin prior to the rise of concerns related to COVID-19 and local quarantine requirements being enacted.
- 2 caregivers with 9 household members participated in the community Workshop that she provided.
- Erin also had the unique opportunity to provide a professional training to 10 teachers located in Pinellas County.
- Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, Building Families began offering virtual/telehealth sessions to our families. Erin provided 89 virtual sessions, along with 16 telephone support sessions.
- Erin also provided 14 Home-based Visits prior to CDC social distancing recommendations being implemented in March
- During 2020, Erin completed 17 in-person visits to referral sources in the Clearwater area, and completed an additional 54 contacts virtually with our community partners.
- This effort to engage the community resulted in 10 families being referred for services during 2020.
- Erin has also enjoyed interacting with the congregation and staff at Trinity Presbyterian Church, even if this interaction may have looked a little different than in prior years! During 2020, she had the opportunity to attend 3 church events and 36 staff meetings.

Erin participated in the virtual Empowered to Connect conference greatly expanding her knowledge of Trust-Based Relational Interventions.


MEANINGFUL CHANGES

If there was a perfect time to potty train a toddler, it would be quarantine, right? Well easier said than done. Mom was struggling to potty train her toddler. With the help of the Family Specialist, mom set up a reward system, but this only seemed to infuriate the tiny tot when she tried to go, nothing happened and therefore she did not get a reward. It was at this point that the Family Specialist helped mom learn the importance of positive praise and recognition. Mom learned how to praise her daughter for even the little things- verbalizing her need to go to the bathroom, sitting on the potty, giving it her best shot. Even when she did not end up having to go, mom made it a fun, positive experience. Mom even set up a chart in the bathroom and gave her daughter a sticker every time she even tried to go. Her daughter's effort was worth recognizing! In just a matter of a week or so, all the positivity paid off and both mom and daughter were finally diaper-free!

CONNECTION DURING COVID-19

Erin used a variety of activities to engage parents and kids alike during video sessions. Many of the children enjoyed picking out goodbye songs on YouTube that they listened and danced along to at the end of each session. Families especially liked activities that used their take home therapy kit supplies such as inflatable microphones to determine who could talk, mini white boards for drawing activities, and stickers and puff balls to track progress on skill usage.

JULY

Erin continued providing telehealth services to her families via supportive phone calls and interactive virtual sessions.

AUGUST

Erin began accepting new families for telehealth services using video sessions. Erin created and delivered a take home therapy kit to ensure that the family had the supplies needed for sessions.

SEPTEMBER

Erin completed the Building Families program with a family and provided a Chick-Fil-A lunch, balloons, and prizes for their picnic celebration.

OCTOBER

Erin recorded a workshop based off of the book, How to Talk So Kids Will Listen and Listen So Kids Will Talk, for the teachers at Trinity Presbyterian Pre School. The recording was shown at their monthly meeting and Erin provided informational material and donuts for the staff.

NOVEMBER

Erin completed the Building Families program with a family who worked with her exclusively via telehealth. The family celebrated with a Pokemon-themed party and games. She also presented a virtual parenting workshop entitled, The Power of Showing Up.

DECEMBER

Erin delivered Christmas gifts to Building Families participants that were collected by Forest Hills Presbyterian Church and The Gathering St. Pete.
